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Translational Research Grants Scheme (TRGS)

- Competitive research grants
- For staff employed within the NSW public health system
 - LHDs
 - Specialty Health Networks
 - NSW Ambulance
 - NSW Health Pathology
- Medical, nursing, allied health, population health practitioners





Purpose of TRGS

- Research projects that will
 - translate into better patient outcomes
 - improve the delivery of health services
 - improve population health and wellbeing
- High quality research
- Relevant to the health system
- Potential to be translated into policy and practice
- Reduce time from evidence generation to implementation
- Enhance research capability and capacity in the NSW health system






Study types

- Translational research and research that can be translated
 - Randomised controlled trials
 - Pragmatic clinical trials
 - Implementation science
 - Health services research
 - Population health research
 - Proof of concept studies







- 1. Local consultation replaces statewide priorities
 - Requirement to show local consultation process undertaken to determine the need or evidence gap, research question, methodology, and outcomes
 - Replaces specific statewide priorities for each round
 - Aiming to make research more useful at a local level and increase implementation of findings





2. All projects must address or align with statewide strategy and processes

- Value Based Care
- Other policy areas as required
 - Virtual Care Monitoring and Evaluation Strategy
 - First 2000 days implementation strategy
- System infrastructure
 - eHealth
- Other implementation partners
 - ACI
 - CEC
- Requirement to document researcher engagement with statewide agencies



- 3. Maximum budget \$500,000
- Service delivery costs not funded
- Project must develop and test a low cost and sustainable process for delivering the intervention
- Will be able to fund more projects across a greater diversity of areas





4. Shorter EOI form

- Focus on how the research was developed
- Assess value and feasibility of project
- Full application stage by invitation





5. A 6th EOI focused on rural/remote or Aboriginal Health

- The maximum number of EOIs able to be submitted by a host organisation is five
- An additional EOI may be submitted if the sixth EOI is focused on rural/remote or Aboriginal Health





Rural and Aboriginal Health

Aboriginal Health:

- Focused entirely on Aboriginal people, or
- Include a broader population but have a significant focus on Aboriginal people, where Aboriginal people will be a subgroup in the analysis.

Projects focused on Aboriginal Health will require Aboriginal Health and Medical Research Council (AH&MRC) ethics approval if funded.

Rural health:

- The project is targeted to improving the health and wellbeing of people living in rural or remote areas, <u>and</u>
- At least one Chief Investigator for the project is from an organisation based in a rural area and works in a rural or remote location.



6. Administering organisation

- Host organisations are encouraged to partner with an administering organisation that can manage funds across financial years
- Partnering university or MRI

27 September	EOIs due to Ministry of Health
Oct - Nov	Review period
15 November	EOI outcomes
21 December	Full applications due
March 2022	Successful applications announced
April - July 2022	Funding awarded
